- Salt Lake City, Utah, encouraged compact development and supported existing communities with its Envision Utah planning process and the Quality Growth Act of 1999. - The Bear Lake Valley Blueprint was a once in-a-generation opportunity to explore growth-related issues and think together about what Bear Lake County/Rich County area should be like in the future. Broad public participation and ownership was the key to a successful process and a vision that captures the place residents want to leave for future generations—a place marked by "Neighborly communities, matchless recreation, agricultural heritage and unparalleled natural resources." - Sacramento, California, calculated that a smart growth infrastructure growth scenario would save \$9.4 billion when compared to conventional development over a 50 year period. Savings would come from having to build less transportation infrastructure, water infrastructure, and flood control and utilities the equivalent of saving about \$18,000 per housing unit or per 2,500 square feet of office or commercial space.
