Since July 2024, through HRSA EHE funds the programs Linkage to Care Program has successfully linked or re-engaged 167 persons living with HIV to medical care. In addition, Mecklenburg County Public Health (MCPH) implemented the Rapid ART Program (RAP) to reduce the time from HIV diagnosis to initiation of Antiretroviral therapy (ART). The ART Linkage to Care Specialist works with the patient to coordinate access to the medication and schedules a follow-up appointment with an external HIV clinic for ongoing care. Since implementation in July 2024, 19 clients have been served and all these clients have been retained in care with 13 of them having achieved viral suppression, which reduces the chances of them transmitting HIV to a partner. Through continued funding the program will be able to continue working with local agencies (sub-recipients) to offer Medical Case Management, Transportation Assistance, Emergency Financial Assistance and Housing Assistance for persons living with HIV throughout the Transitional Grant Area (TGA).

The North Carolina Department of Adult Correction is awarding Mecklenburg County's Local Re-Entry Council \$15,540 via Criminal Justice Services.2. The funds can be used by Criminal Justice Services for vocational training and emergency housing expenses for persons being released from incarceration and returning to Mecklenburg County.3. The department will use the funds to pay for emergency housing and vocational training expenses for persons receiving re-entry case management services from Criminal Justice Services.4. The funds will benefit those returning to Mecklenburg County after serving a period of incarceration.

Staff Response(s)	1. The North Carolina Council for Women and Youth Involvement (NCCWYI) is the direct recipient of these federal funds. Mecklenburg County Community Support Services (CSS) applied to NCCWYI to receive funds to implement in Mecklenburg County. The contract is between NCCWYI and CSS. 2. The BOCC had previously approved a RFBA for CSS to receive \$123,000 through this grant (#24-0643). This new RFBA increases the funding amount by \$262,000, for a total grant amount of \$385,000. 3. These funds will assist victims of intimate partner violence with financial needs such as rent, utilities, mortgage, arrears, temporary hotel/motel lodging, vehicle repairs, employment-related expenses, safety related expenses. The goal of the funding is to help victims of intimate partner violence on their path to safety and stability. Payments are made to vendors on behalf of victims with financial need.
