






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




2. IN MAY 2022

Just before Title 42 was set to end in May of 2022, two dozen states sued the Federal Government over its plan to end the policy. A U.S. District Judge also issued a nationwide injunction, barring the White House from lifting the policy.

3. IN JANUARY 2023

Fast forward to January 2023, and the U.S. officially announced the impending end of the COVID-19 public health emergency, scheduled for May 11. Days later, the White House announced that they would lift Title 42 once the public health emergency ended.



1. IN MARCH 2020

In March 2020, as the world grappled with the onslaught of the COVID-19 pandemic, the U.S. Government reinstated Title 42 to help slow the spread of the virus at our borders. Under its provisions, U.S. officials gained the authority to rapidly turn away migrants at the southern border, including those seeking asylum. As an organization that primarily serves the Latino community, Camino knew it had to prepare for the end of Title 42 as it could lead to an influx of new arrivals. In April 2022, a pivotal shift occurred when The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) declared that the code was no longer necessary since cases were diminishing.

Determined to gain first-hand insight into the border crisis, Rusty Price, founder and CEO of Camino, led a team on a journey to the U.S.-Mexico border to debunk misinformation surrounding the crisis and Latino migrants. This included addressing myths about illegal crossings, criminals entering the U.S., job competition, and much more. Armed with questions developed by Camino Research Institute (CRI), they traversed the landscapes of El Paso, Texas; Las Cruces, New Mexico; and Juarez, Mexico, seeking to unravel the intricate web of hopes, fears, and aspirations of the migrants awaiting entry.

4. IN MAY 2023

As the calendar pages flipped to May 11, 2023, the final curtain fell on Title 42. Although migrant encounters dropped directly following the end of the policy, migrants who were permitted entry began to chart their courses toward states housing immigration courts, with Charlotte, North Carolina emerging as a beacon of hope.

For Rusty and Camino, this created a new era of challenges, responsibilities, and possibilities. With a surge of newcomers knocking at their doors, Camino quickly ramped up operations, striving to meet the growing needs of both established patients and the influx of new arrivals.

- Provided transportation support for 440 individuals (bus pass, uber)
- Facilitated employment support to 265 individuals
- Offered clothing support to 626 individuals

Among the many who found hope in Camino's support was Pedro—a father, husband, business owner, and friend to many. As the organization extended its helping hand to hundreds of newcomers and their families, Pedro's journey mirrored the collective odyssey of those who dared to dream of a better life in the U.S.



AS A DIRECT RESULT OF THE BORDER CRISIS, CAMINO:

- Served a total of 807 newcomers
- Assisted 188 school-aged children
- Found permanent housing for 422 individuals (renting)
- Established temporary housing for 385 individuals (family/friend, shelter, hotel)
- Helped 43 children with school registration

PEDRO'S JOURNEY

What compelling factors could prompt someone to forsake their beloved homeland?

Economic prospects, the specter of violence, political turbulence, and the absence of vital resources and support services—these are the forces that compel many Latino migrants to depart from their homelands. This is the story of Pedro.

In the shadows of Venezuela's political unrest, Pedro's journey began as a desperate bid for safety and sanctuary amidst the chaos of his homeland. Fleeing extortion and violence, he sought refuge in Ecuador, where he built a successful business and life with his family. Yet, even there, danger lurked in every corner. With his business flourishing, so too did the relentless demands for extortion, stemming from the Ecuadorian government, local enterprises, law enforcement, and underworld figures—each vying for a piece of Pedro's hard-earned prosperity.

Initially, Pedro complied with the requests, but as time elapsed, fear gnawed at him. He dreaded the thought of his children inheriting a life defined by fear and extortion.

The thought of his family becoming pawns in the hands of those he funded haunted him, as he feared that halting payments might provoke retribution, endangering his loved ones and subjecting them to the threat of abduction for further ransom demands.





















Forced to flee once more, Pedro and his loved ones embarked on a treacherous journey to the U.S. with dreams of a brighter future.

However, their path was fraught with peril. Navigating dense jungles, disturbing sights of lifeless bodies strewn along the path reminded them of those who had succumbed to the journey before them. They also endured the bone-chilling cold of a train ride through the dead of night, shivering from the lack of adequate supplies as they clung to hope amidst the darkness. Each step forward was a gamble, a desperate bid for a chance at a brighter future despite the looming shadows of trauma and uncertainty.

Finally arriving in the border town of Juarez, Pedro's trip took a fortuitous turn when he met Rusty Price. Extending a hand of friendship and kindness to Pedro and his family, Rusty offered them not just assistance, but hope.

In that pivotal moment, Rusty's kindness became a lifeline for Pedro and his loved ones, opening doors and paving the way for a new beginning in Charlotte, North Carolina.

With gratitude in their hearts and determination in their spirits, Pedro's family crossed the border into the land of promise and possibility. Guided by the light of compassion, they headed straight for Camino.

Their journey was far from over, but with Camino's support, they faced the challenges ahead with renewed strength and resilience. As they embarked on the next chapter of their lives, Pedro's family carried with them the memory of Rusty's kindness.

Upon arriving at Camino's doors, the trauma and scars from the trip were evident. Camino Health Center extended its helping hand, assisting the family through their primary care clinic and food pantry.

With little to no supplies, they lacked essential items such as clothing. Through The WearHouse, Camino's thrift store, the family received free clothing and other necessities to support them in their time of need.

At Camino, Pedro and his family received more than just medical care, clothing, and a helping hand—they found solace, community, and a sense of belonging. Through Camino, they were lifted up and given the tools to rebuild their lives.

Today, Pedro has a wide network of connections through Camino. In his new life, he has already established another successful business, shining a light on his work ethic as a Latino.

Pedro's story is not just his own—it is a reflection of the trials and triumphs of countless Latino migrants who turn to Camino for support and guidance. In their struggle, we see the resilience of the human spirit, and in their journey, we find inspiration to continue our mission of equipping people to live healthy, hopeful, and productive lives.
















HEALTH

Camino Health Center is our bilingual and multicultural health center that takes a holistic approach to healthcare through a primary care clinic, behavioral health services, health education and wellness programming, and a food pantry. In 2023, recognizing the importance of accessibility and outreach, CHC established a new clinic in Kannapolis, NC. This expansion not only provided vital healthcare services to a new community but also ensured that individuals in underserved areas had access to quality care closer to home.

Additionally, the state has approved CHC's Peer Support Training Manual, 'A Pathway to Recovery: Un Camino A La recuperación,' distinguishing us as one of the 13 organizations in NC qualified to train individuals as Peer Support Specialists.

The concept of peer support for recovery encompasses various activities and interactions between people who have had similar experiences related to the diagnosis of mental illness. Furthermore, CHC has translated the manual, solidifying our position as the sole provider of Spanish Peer Support training in the state, with Spanish training sessions scheduled to start in 2024. Lastly, CHC attended the AstraZeneca Foundation's 30-Year Anniversary conference in Wilmington, DE after receiving a \$120,000 grant from the organization. This grant has been utilized to develop innovative approaches to addressing healthcare disparities in our community.

Throughout the past year, CHC has remained steadfast in its mission to equip people to live healthy lives.

LOOKING AHEAD

From addressing physical ailments to tending to the wounds of the soul, Camino Health Center has been a source of healing and hope in the darkest hours for many newcomers and pre-existing patients.

Looking ahead, CHC will expand all of its services while also implementing a new dental program in 2024.

CHC will also reimagine its health and wellness program to focus more on nutrition education. With these new changes, CHC looks forward to equipping more people to live healthy lives.



Arriba is our bilingual upward economic mobility program with a mission to equip people to live productive lives. Through a blend of educational courses, employment pathways, and *entrepreneurial training, Arriba strives to empower individuals to overcome barriers that hinder them from achieving their dreams.

LOOKING AHEAD

Employment for Latino migrants, whether they arrived 10 years ago or last year, is essential for their economic stability and integration into their new communities. Looking ahead, Arriba plans to partner with additional businesses to connect Latino employees with job openings.

The team will also introduce a new program to train employees for advancement within their current organization. Additionally, Arriba will offer advanced English classes tailored to Latin American professionals, helping them grasp the American business language to boost their careers and navigate the business world more confidently. Alongside these initiatives, they will also launch another entrepreneur course. Arriba looks forward to equipping more people to live productive lives in 2024.



CAMINO

Camino United is our free youth soccer program that provides kids with the experience of playing and training at a club or academy level without the high costs. The program aims to instill the values of discipline, respect, teamwork, fellowship, and accountability—values that can be applied in all areas of life both on and off the soccer field. Camino United hosted its first soccer tournament in 2023, where the players competed against other youth soccer programs in the Charlotte area.

By hosting soccer practices, camps, tournaments, and training sessions, Camino United offers a welcoming environment where Charlotte's youth can find a sense of belonging and community while developing their skills as an athlete.

LOOKING AHEAD

Camino United aims to extend its reach to more children who are eager to enhance their soccer skills and embrace heightened competition. To achieve this, the program intends to expand its team roster, develop additional partnerships with leagues, and compete in a broader array of tournaments, offering players more avenues to showcase their abilities. Moreover, Camino United plans to establish clinics within the communities that Camino Church serves, ensuring accessibility while also fostering more relationships.

RESEARCH

Camino Research Institute (CRI) is a hub for community-driven research that informs the development and implementation of services and policies that meet the needs of Latinos.

CRI utilizes community-based participatory research (CBPR) approaches to understand the social determinants of health impacting Latino communities.

Their data is also used by Camino to inform the programs and services offered to the community.

CRI prioritizes disseminating findings back to the local community in Spanish, while also disseminating findings at regional, national, and international conferences and in peer-reviewed journals.

Camino Research Institute published its second paper in an academic journal. The paper titled, "What should I do? We still have to go to work: Latino immigrant perceptions of the COVID-19 pandemic and vaccine" was published in The International Journal of Migration, Health and Social Care.


1. Values and Aspirations of Latino Employees (VALE):

A mixed method study to understand the relationship between Latino immigrants and work, including the meaningfulness of work, workplace values, and employment barriers. Results can be used to establish a welcoming workplace environment for Latino immigrants, leading to increased employee retention and satisfaction.

LOOKING AHEAD

Looking ahead, CRI will continue advancing the North Carolina Latino Community Strength and Needs Assessment (LCSNA), with plans to release a report on Western North Carolina. Camino will use this data to inform efforts to take services out to communities. Data from the LCSNA will also help CRI direct and prioritize additional community-based research projects.

In 2024, CRI remains committed to ensuring research findings are widely accessible and available in both Spanish and English.

With this in mind, Camino aims to make NC the best place for Latinos to live—a goal that requires significant expansion. We will accomplish this expansion through three main focus areas:

Círculos (Circles): We will implement a holistic and faith-filled cell group model embodying the DNA of Camino, transforming neighborhoods into communities that are healthy, hopeful, and productive.


The first two focus areas emphasize our commitment to the local community. The third element presents itself in the form of a movement.

At its core, El Futuro Es Latino (EFEL) seeks to empower Latinos in the U.S., as they inevitably become the majority population.

Our goal is for them to embrace a sense of belonging, eradicating the need for self-segregation driven by feelings of exclusion. The reality is that Latinos are here, and we champion their rightful place in shaping the American narrative.

EFEL's mission also challenges existing paradigms and encourages Latinos to not only seize opportunities but also play a vital role in shaping American culture, systems, and values.





Moreover, EFEL is committed to educating the broader population, dispelling stereotypes and myths that perpetuate fear and division. By addressing misconceptions like job theft, lack of education, etc., this initiative aims to highlight the positive contributions Latinos bring to society, emphasizing the importance of faith, family, and a strong work ethic.



Chîle Ghez No Picas Chîle ghe No Sirve Rusty Price, who is spearheading the movement, acknowledges the wholesome values and work ethic prevalent in Latino communities and believes that an increase in Latino engagement and research data can lead to positive societal change.

He is committed to advocating for the inclusion of Latinos in various systems, from education to economics, while also encouraging Latinos to take action. By acculturating systems to the needs of the Latino population and addressing issues such as access to financial assistance, credit, and cultural adaptation in institutions like schools, EFEL will foster unity within the Latino community.



Camino's celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month where the community joins Camino for a fun evening with games, food, and music.


English Learner Family Academic Symposium: 500 individuals received information


AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) ROUND 1 (FY23 - FY25)




AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) ROUND 2 (FY24 - FY25)

MECKLENBURG COUNTY ACCESS TO **CARE CONTRACT (FY 23-FY25)**






IMMIGRANT NEWCOMER TASK FORCE (TITLE 42) MAY 2023 - SEPT. 2024
