25-0188 PROCLAMATION – TAKE DOWN TOBACCO DAY (COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND-INGRAM)

The proclamation was sponsored by Commissioner Townsend-Ingram and co-sponsored by Vice Chair Altman and Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell

Background: Take Down Tobacco National Day of Action is a day of anti-smoking activism. Teachers, kids, youth leaders, and health advocates all participate. They come together and organize events to raise awareness of the high smoking rates in our communities, encourage kids to stay tobacco-free, and promote initiatives that support healthier, tobacco-free lifestyles.

Mecklenburg County North Carolina Proclamation

WHEREAS, tobacco use remains the leading preventable cause of death and disease in the U.S., killing more than 490,000 people every year; and

WHEREAS, 95% of adult tobacco users start before the age of 21 with 90% starting before age 18; and

WHEREAS, nicotine harms developing brains and its use during adolescence can disrupt the formation of brain circuits that control attention and learning; and increase the risk for lifelong addiction; and

WHEREAS, 1 in 6 high school students in Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools in 2021 (Youth Risk Behavior Survey) reported being current users of electronic vapor products (such as e-cigs, e-cigars, vape pens, e-hookahs or hookah pens); and

WHEREAS, using e-cigarettes and vaping products can worsen depression in youth and can contribute to development, maintenance and recurrence of anxiety disorders; and

WHEREAS, as of 2023 there are nearly 1,000 tobacco retail sites, such as convenient stores, gas stations, smoke and vape shops, etc. in Mecklenburg County. A review of a sample of these tobacco retailers revealed that more than 70% were located within a half mile of K-12 schools; and

WHEREAS, the Mecklenburg Board of County Commissioners supports North Carolina protecting our youth from easy access to addictive tobacco products by raising the age of purchase to 21 and creating a tobacco retail permitting system to help prevent sales to minors; and

WHEREAS, the Mecklenburg Board of County Commissioners is committed to fighting for a healthier, equitable future, free of addiction, for all young people and supports year-round youth tobacco prevention best practice policies and interventions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mecklenburg Board of County Commissioners does hereby proclaim April 1, 2025, as

"TAKE DOWN TOBACCO DAY OF ACTION"

in Mecklenburg County and commend its observance to all citizens.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

25-0179 PUBLIC HEARING – BUSINESS LOCATION AND EXPANSION - DETRAPEL, INC.

Background: DetraPel, Inc., is a clean-tech advanced materials company established in 2013 and based in Framingham, MA. The company specializes in creating PFAS-free protective coatings.

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Their innovation focuses on synthesizing and manufacturing stain repellents applicable to various sectors, including footwear, apparel, consumer and commercial textiles, industrial paper and food packaging, healthcare, technical textiles, and electronics.

Currently, they are considering the development of a 40,000 square foot facility in Charlotte to serve as a research and development center. This new site is planned to include cleanrooms, manufacturing, and warehouse spaces, enhancing their capabilities in producing advanced materials.

The proposed project meets all the following grant guidelines for a 3-year Business Investment Program Grant, specifically:

- \cdot A taxable investment of \$3,500,000 to be completed in the next three years.
- · Creation of 35 new jobs with an average wage of \$71,794 (which is equal or greater than 100% of the average SOC codes for each job position for the Charlotte-Gastonia-Rock Hill M.S.A.).
- · There is competition for this project from Fort Mill, SC.

The general terms and conditions of this grant include:

- · A portion of the grant must be repaid if the company moves this investment from Charlotte within 3 years of the end of the grant term.
- · Actual grant payments are based on the value of the investment as appraised by the Mecklenburg County Tax Office.
- · All property taxes due from the company must be paid before a grant payment is made.

The Board of County Commissioners indicated their intent to approve this grant in a closed session on 12/03/2024.

Motion was made by Commissioner Dunlap, seconded by Commissioner Griffin, and unanimously carried, to open public hearing to receive comments on a proposed Business Investment Program grant to DetraPel, Inc.





MECKLENBURG COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS RESOLUTION APPROVING BUSINESS INVESTMENT PROGRAM GRANT FOR DETRAPEL, INC.

WHEREAS, DetraPel. Inc., is seeking to expand their operations in Mecklenburg County; and

WHEREAS, the organization evaluated sites in Fort Mill, SC; and

WHEREAS, this project as described by the company was determined to meet all of the criteria for a Business Investment Program grant from the County of Mecklenburg, the Board of Commissioners voted its intent to provide a Business Investment Program grant to the company during a closed session meeting on 12/03/2024, and as authorized by the Board, the County communicated this information to the company; and

WHEREAS, taking into consideration the Board's stated intent to make an economic development grant, the company subsequently decided to expand in Mecklenburg County. The project will include a capital investment of \$3,500,000 and will create 35 new jobs within 3 years at an average wage of \$71,794. The Business Investment Program grant is a 50% grant over 3 years, with a not to exceed amount of \$34,536. The grant will be subject to the County's standard contract provisions, including compliance requirements for the company related to job creation targets and claw back provisions; and

WHEREAS, Mecklenburg County Board of Commissioners has determined that this grant will provide new employment, new taxable property and new economic activity within the County, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the Board of County Commissioners does hereby approve the Business Investment Program grant as described above and authorizes the County Manager to execute a contract for the same, with any necessary or helpful nonmaterial changes.

The Town approved the original subdivision which included the realignment of the road, and the Planning Director has no objection to the abandonment. NCDOT requested a resolution of support from the County. See attached email dated April 3, 2024. Also, all three property owners requested that the County abandon this portion of June Washam Road. See Petition and Exhibit A attached.

The provisions of General Statute section 136-63 allow a property owner to petition the Board of County Commissioners to request the Board of Transportation to abandon any road in the secondary system when the best interest of the people of the county will be served by the abandonment. All the property owners adjacent to this portion of June Washam Road have signed the petition requesting the abandonment. The Land Use and Environmental Services Agency has determined it is in the best interest of the people of Mecklenburg County for the Board of Transportation to abandon the right-of-way and maintenance of this portion of June Washam Road.
