Many clinical nurse specialists additionally receive certification from a national professional nursing organization which provides tangible recognition of professional achievement in a clinical area of nursing. These nurses have met the eligibility requirements and passed a national examination specific to their area of practice.

Dear Ms. Marlin:

Your letter concerning the above referenced issues was received at the office of the North Carclina Board of Mursing on July 18, 1988.

In regards to the first issue, Mr. Bryant Pairis, Executive Director of the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners has informed me that there is no existing North Carolina law which states that "nurses may do physicals, but a doctor has to sign the physical". A physician must participate in the physical examination when a medical diagnosis is the expected or required outcome of the physical examination.

The second question posed in your letter refers to funding for independent practitioners of nursing. The North Carolina Board of Nursing directs it's activities toward the regulation of nursing practice. Scholarships and/or state monies are not channeled for dissemination through the Board of Nursing. I refer you to your professional organizations for information on funding:

Wby Choose Nursing Services?

Nursing services are utilized for most everyday health care needs and are provided by nurses who are fully qualified to assess, diagnose and treat common conditions within their areas of specialty.

Why a Registered Nurse?

Registered nurses are a viable solution to many of the problems in America's health care crisis. Nurses are highly educated, skilled, cost effective, available, and flexible. They work in all health care settings, particularly in underserved cities and rural communities, and present economical alternatives to physician-centered health care. Their focus on wellness and preventive care makes sense in today's increasingly complex health care system.

Nurses provide primary care. Primary health care is a way of delivering health care. It is the care the client receives at the first point of contact with the health care system that leads to a decision on what must be done to help resolve the presenting health problem. It also is continuous and comprehensive care, including all the services necessary for health promotion, prevention of disease and disability, health maintenance, and in some cases rehabilitation. Primary health care includes identification, management, and/or referral of health problems, as well as promotion of health-maintaining behavior and prevention of illness.

Reasons for choosing a Registered Nurse:

"Whole person" approach to health care: Nurses have combined nursing, biological, and psychological education and are taught to look at the whole person, rather than concentrating on individual symptoms of illness. Health promotion, teaching, and counseling are central to nursing.

Time: A nurse spends time with patients and their families, to listen, explain, answer questions, and talk about the patient's general health.

Coordination of care: The registered nurse coordinates care, refers patients to appropriate health care providers, explains to the patient the reasons for a course of treatment, and advocates on the patient's behalf.

Lower costs: Nurses are cost effective because their services are less expensive and they work to prevent costly illnesses and hospitalizations. For example:

- 60% to 80% of primary and preventive care traditionally performed by physicians can be done by a nurse at a lower cost.
- Geriatric Nurse Practitioners are able to care for 80-95% of the health problems that arise among nursing home residents. Having such nursing services available reduces the rate of hospitalization and emergency room admissions, results in less use of restraints, and maximizes physical as well as cognitive functioning with no added costs.
- Using nurses to provide prenatal care increases the availability of this type of care while reducing its cost, decreases the number
 of low birth weight babies, and provides significant savings to the health care system as a whole.

Health maintenance organizations

Home care settings

Hospice

Hospitals

Nursing homes

Private practice

Schools

Registered nurses are also in medically underserved communities, such as inner cities, rural areas, long-term care facilities, state mental health facilities and prisons. (American Nurses Association, 1992)
