Chair Dunlap called this portion of the meeting to order, which was followed by introductions, invocation by Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell, and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag; after which, the matters below were addressed.

AWARDS/RECOGNITION

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23-0598 JOINT PROCLAMATION – DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH & SURVIVORS' DAY (CHAIR DUNLAP)

Adopt a joint proclamation declaring October 2023 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month and October 21, 2023, as Survivors' Day in Mecklenburg County.

Commissioner Laura Meier read the proclamation.

Background: In order to honor domestic violence survivors, raise community awareness about the prevalence of domestic violence, and show support for the individuals and organizations who provide advocacy, services, and assistance to victims, Mecklenburg County, in concert with the City of Charlotte, proclaims October 2023 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month and recognizes October 21, 2023, as Domestic Violence Survivors Day. All residents are encouraged to learn about Domestic Violence and the associated resources available in our community.

Motion was made by Commissioner Meier, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to adopt a joint proclamation declaring October 2023 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month and October 21, 2023, as Survivors' Day in Mecklenburg County.

PROCLAMATION

City of Charlotte/Mecklenburg County

WHEREAS, domestic violence is a serious offense that impacts people of every background and identity, manifesting in a multitude of forms including physical, sexual, verbal, emotional, psychological, and financial abuse; and

WHEREAS, domestic violence is prevalent in Mecklenburg County, with over 25,000 domestic violence-related calls for service placed to local law enforcement each year; and

WHEREAS, these documented calls for help represent only a fraction of those in our community who experience the hidden impacts of domestic violence in secrecy and silence; and

WHEREAS, the effects of domestic violence can be long-term and far-reaching, with implications for public health and safety, economic costs, child development, mental health, and generational cycles of abuse; and

WHEREAS, our community offers a continuum of care made up of nonprofit, for-profit, public, grassroots, and survivorled partners to support and empower those impacted by domestic violence as they seek out safety, hope, and healing; and

WHEREAS, communities nationwide recognize Domestic Violence Awareness Month in October, and the enhancement of this awareness month with a dedicated Domestic Violence Survivors Day creates a unique opportunity to recognize, honor, and celebrate the courage of victims and survivors in Mecklenburg County; and

WHEREAS, Mecklenburg County will further acknowledge this awareness month by presenting current data to stakeholders during the *The Status of Intimate Partner Violence in Mecklenburg County* event on October 12, 2023; and

WHEREAS, Mecklenburg County will bring education and resources to the public through a *Community Conversations Series* in 2024 highlighting the connections between intimate partner violence and substance use;

NOW, THEREFORE, WE, Vi Alexander Lyles, Mayor of the City of Charlotte, and George Dunlap, Chair of the Mecklenburg Board of County Commissioners, do hereby proclaim October 2023 and October 21, 2023, respectively, as

APPOINTMENTS

23-0601 APPOINTMENTS -TRANSIT SERVICES ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Board voted on one appointment needed for the Transit Services Advisory Committee, which was a three-year term expiring January 31, 2026, for the BOCC slot. Robert Moran was the only applicant.

Background: This is a City of Charlotte Committee in which the BOCC has one slot.

The committee reviews, makes recommendations, and provides input into short-range transit operations. The TSAC focuses on day-to-day operations of the transit service to ensure that it meets the needs of the community. TSAC makes recommendations to the Metropolitan Transit

Commission (MTC) on issues within its sphere of interest and acts as a vehicle to promote public involvement in short-term transit planning. The committee serves as a forum for citizen

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suggestions and complaints concerning fares, routes, and schedules. It also serves as an advocacy group for public transportation services and reviews staff recommendations on services provision and transit policies. The TSAC reviews and makes recommendations on minimum performance standards for the system. The TSAC also explores emerging issues in public transit and works with staff on solutions.

Motion was made by Commissioner Altman, seconded by Commissioner Meier, and unanimously carried, to appoint Robert Moran to the Transit Services Advisory Committee for a three-year term expiring January 31, 2026.

23-0602 APPOINTMENTS - WOMEN'S ADVISORY BOARD

The Board voted on four nominations/appointments needed on the Women's Advisory Board to fill four (4) unexpired terms.

Motion was made by Commissioner Cotham, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to appoint Kandice McQueen, Camellia Nixon, Delynn Turner, and Sherri Winters, on the Women's Advisory Board to fill four (4) unexpired terms.

23-0609 APPOINTMENTS - DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ADVISORY BOARD

The Board voted on two appointments needed on the Domestic Violence Advisory Board to fill two (2) unexpired terms expiring April 30, 2024.

Background: On September 19, 2023, the Board nominated Tashara Brown and Delynn Turner for appointment consideration to the Domestic Violence Advisory Board.

Motion was made by Commissioner Meier, seconded by Jerrell, and unanimously carried to appoint Tashara Brown, on the Domestic Violence Advisory Board to fill one (1) unexpired term expiring April 30, 2024.

NOTE: Delynn Turner was no longer eligible for this Board due to being appointed to the Women's Advisory Board.





FEDERAL LAW

Title 44 of the Code of Federal Regulations,
Section 60.3(d)(3), communities must "...prohibit
encroachments, including fill, new construction,
substantial improvements, and other development
within the adopted regulatory floodway unless it has
been demonstrated through hydrologic and
hydraulic analyses performed in accordance with
standard engineering practice that the proposed
encroachment would not result in any increase in flood
levels within the community during the
occurrence of the base flood discharge."



LAWS / REGULATIONS

Lake-Wide Idle Speed Regulation: Boats

No person may operate a boat on Lake Wylie in excess of idle speed within <u>50 feet</u> of (i) a moored or an anchored vessel, (ii) a person in the water, (iii) any <u>private</u> wharf, (iv) any <u>private</u> dock, (v) any <u>private</u> bulkhead, or (vi) any <u>private</u> pier.

For reference, 52 feet is the width of 4 lanes of I-85

EXISTING South Carolina law- SC 50-21-870 B (6) (b)



LAWS / REGULATIONS

New Lake Wide-Idle Speed Regulation: Wake Surfing

No one shall Wake Surf on Lake Wylie in excess of idle speed within <u>200 feet</u> of (i) a moored or an anchored vessel, (ii) a person in the water, (iii) any wharf, (iv) any dock, (v) any bulkhead, or (vi) any pier.



EROSION CONTROL - SFRHP

EROSION CONTROL – SFRHP

More Opportunities to Strengthen Policies

- Double or single High-hazard silt fencing within 100 feet of streams and wetlands
- Monitor waterways downstream of large development sediment basins
 - Devices identify problems in real time for rapid corrective action
- Expand buffer requirements in all County
 FEMA floodplains

Erosion Control – SFRHP

- Increase Post-Construction retention pond capacity for to handle a 25-year flood vs a 10-year flood
- Make them SOP for Gaston County
- Seek similar E&SCMs in Lincoln and Catawba Counties



Erosion Control - SFRHP

 - Improve agricultural use & land conservation
 - Encourage upstream neighbors to follow suit
- Pursue state engagement and advocacy for those E&SCM policies

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Vice-Chair Powell said the work of Mr. Brennan's leadership and his team made things better, i.e., the Wilkinson bridge, safety on the lake, potential drownings, and water management.

Commissioner Meier recommended going out on the water with Mr. Brennan to see how wildlife is affected.

MANAGER'S REPORT

23-0588 RESOLUTION ADVANCING THE TIME FOR GENERAL REAPPRAISAL OF REAL PROPERTY

The Board received information regarding adopting the Mecklenburg County Board of Commissioners Resolution Advancing the Time for General Reappraisal of Real Property to a Quadrennial Cycle.

Background: Pursuant to G.S. 105-283 and G.S. 317, each county must reappraise all real property in accordance with the initial statutory provisions and every eighth year thereafter, unless the county advances the date.

Pursuant to G.S. 105-286, a County has the option to advance reappraisal of real property earlier than required by subdivision (1) or (2) of G.S. 105-283 if the board of county commissioners adopts a resolution providing for advancement of the reappraisal.

Absent an advancement, the Octennial Cycle, for reappraisal for properties in Mecklenburg County will be January 1, 2031. Staff recommends, pursuant to NC G.S. 105-286(a)(3), that the Board advance the time for a general reappraisal of real property to a quadrennial cycle which would be January 1, 2027.

Ken Joyner, County Assessor gave the presentation.



Revaluation Advancement

- NCGS 105-286 (a) established the Octennial Cycle, meaning that each county was required to conduct a revaluation at least once every 8 years
- NCGS 105-286 (a) (3) allows counties to advance a revaluation to a cycle more frequent than the 8-year cycle



Revaluation Advancement

- The 2019 revaluation was completed in accordance with the octennial cycle, following the 2011 revaluation
- The 2023 revaluation was advanced, by resolution, to a 4-year cycle in October of 2019



Revaluation Advancement

- The 2027 revaluation resolution will advance the next revaluation and set Mecklenburg County on a 4-year, Quadrennial Cycle, moving forward.
- Future revaluations following the 2027 year would be:

2035

2039 and so on

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RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MECKLENBURG COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA ADVANCING THE TIME FOR GENERAL APPRAISAL OF REAL PROPERTY

WHEREAS, pursuant to G.S. 105-283 and G.S. 105-317, each County must reappraise all real property in accordance with the initial statutory provisions and every eighth year thereafter, unless the County advances the date; and

WHEREAS, under the Octennial Cycle, the County of Mecklenburg will be required to reappraise all real property as of January 1, 2031, in accordance with the provisions of North Carolina General Statutes 105-283 and 105-317; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to North Carolina General Statutes 105-286(a)(3), the County may advance the time for a general reappraisal of real property to a shorter period and may, by resolution, designate a new reappraisal cycle that is more frequent than the required Octennial Cycle; and

WHEREAS, the County previously, by Resolution dated 01 October 2019, advanced the date of revaluation to January 1, 2023, under the provisions established by GS 105-286(a)(3); and

WHEREAS, the Tax Assessor has requested that the Board of County Commissioners advance the time of the next general reappraisal of real property to January 1, 2027, and designate a Quadrennial Cycle (every four years) for general reappraisals of real property. Now therefore be it,

RESOLVE:

- The Board of County Commissioners hereby adopts a Quadrennial Cycle (every four years) for general reappraisals of real property pursuant to the provisions of North Carolina General Statutes 105-286(a)(3).
- The next general reappraisal of real property within the County of Mecklenburg, North Carolina is hereby advanced to January 1, 2027, pursuant to the provisions of North Carolina General Statutes 105-286(a)(3).
- The Tax Assessor shall promptly forward a copy of this Resolution to the North Carolina Department of Revenue.
- The Tax Assessor shall promptly forward a copy of this Resolution to each of the taxing units located within the County.

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Commissioner Jerrell asked if they looked at a 2-year cycle. Mr. Joyner said there was some discussion about a 2-year cycle. He said it was determined that to move to a 2-year cycle, they would have to hire an additional 40 appraisers because they would need to immediately begin working on the next cycle while working on appeals and, therefore, looked at a 4-year cycle instead.

Commissioner Griffin said he anticipated tightening of the market. He said he figured four years was better than eight.

Chair Dunlap thanked him for explaining that the initial 4-years was a one-off and adopting this resolution made it an ongoing 4-year cycle. He said it took staff so long to do appraisals and then had to do field surveys so that they didn't bump up on each other, so that is why we decided on the 4-year cycle as opposed to the 2-year cycle.

Motion was made by Commissioner Meier, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to adopt the Mecklenburg County Board of Commissioners Resolution Advancing the Time for General Reappraisal of Real Property to a Quadrennial Cycle.

Mr. Joyer announced that at their most recent conference in Salt Lake City, they were awarded their recertification on the Certificate of Excellence and Assessment Administration, which was one of the driving items that the Board back in 2013 impressed on him to get. He said they not only achieved it but completed their first five-year cycle and had been recertified on that. He said also at the last board meeting they were one of the departments that had a partnership with OTC and ITS on the Award of Innovation.

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

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Chair Dunlap thanked Ms. Tanner for her work and her engagement in all the steering committees from NACO.

Commissioner Leake said retired teachers needed to return to the classrooms so that there were qualified teachers. *Ms. Tanner said measures in the budget included increasing the teacher salary, but she was not sure about retired teachers returning to the classroom.*

Commissioner Meier asked about investigatory powers, authorized to enter into private homes and office buildings; our own government can reject any records request in the state legislature. *Ms. Tanner said it would broaden the limitations of laws and access to public buildings, public records, and public staff.*

Commissioner Meier stated that she was very disturbed by some of these powers. She also wanted to note that under that provision, public employees under investigation would be required to keep all communication requests confidential and could not even alert their supervisor.

Chair Dunlap said although some of the bills have passed, some of them would be litigated as to if they are constitutional.

Vice-Chair Powell thanked Ms. Tanner for her work and presence in NACO and NCACC meetings. She spoke about the protection of our natural resources and the dismantling of environmental protections. She thanked Governor Cooper for HB600. She said protecting air and water should be a bipartisan issue.

Commissioner Altman said with regard to environmental issues, we would pay now or pay later. She said we could have forward-thinking laws to reduce global warming or pretend it's not there, go another election cycle and pay later.

Commissioner Altman asked Acting County Manager Anthony Trotman what the mention around the tailored plan and behavioral health was. She said she recollected that it was difficult to cross this threshold and convert over to a new system because not all regions were ready. She asked what that meant for Mecklenburg County. *Mr. Trotman said that they were looking to merging some of the LMACOs going from 6 to 4, which was one of the issues. He said the other issue was that some of the tailored plans were struggling to have all the providers sign on to the provider panel, specifically our tailored plan. He said Alliance was struggling to have Atrium sign on to their provider panel. He said they had a conversation with Atrium and Alliance to help bridge the gap.*

Commissioner Altman asked with regard to the State budget, if he had a sense of whether it improved or where we were with behavioral health in terms of what was just reported by Ms. Tanner. Mr. Trotman said that in some aspects, it improved. He said they would move forward with a tailored plan but were opposed to the third plan. He said there was the Standard Plan, which was Physical Health; a Tailored Plan, which was Behavioral Health; and then there is the third plan which is the Foster Care plan, which they were opposed to because they developed a strong relationship with Alliance to build out such things as the Behavioral Health Urgent Care and other local activities but were overruled and the State is mandating there will be a statewide foster care plan.

Commissioner Chair Dunlap said that he thought the tailored plan required the LMEO to provide mental and physical health care. *Acting County Manager Anthony Trotman said that is correct.*

Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell thanked Ms. Tanner. She mentioned the Lake Wylie presentation and how important the water is. She also said that it was very disturbing for the State Legislature to shield its own public records and allow destroying and selling of records.

Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell asked about orphan roads. Ms. Tanner said no, but that our delegation members have been listening and were still having conversations about it.

Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell said that the local funding is out of balance.

Commissioner Griffin made comments.

Commissioner Jerrell asked, concerning language that talks about County local government actions prohibiting imposing wage compensation, if they could get information on what certain economic development incentives mean and what falls into that bucket. He also wanted to understand if an entity contracts with the County and if it was restricted from that requirement even if they were contracting with us at a certain level. *Ms. Tanner said yes unless a provision in a federal grant was included. She said many of the federal construction grants required prevailing wage requirements, which was a part of that federal grant money that state law couldn't preempt. She said that was the one exception, and other than that, we would be prohibited from imposing waiver restrictions on anyone other than our own employees.*

Commissioner Jerrell asked Acting County Manager Anthony Trotman about school nurses. Does the language allow us to go away from the 4-year requirement? Acting County Manager Anthony Trotman said the language was consistent with what was communicated to the Board several months ago by our Public Health Team, which would allow us to utilize RNs in certain capacities to serve as school nurses even if they don't have the BSN. He said because there was such a critical

need within the community in CMS, they potentially had the ability to open up additional access and resources for the school system and provide that element to the children and have begun the process.

Chair Dunlap said it's about who you have advocating for you and what you ask for. Sometimes you get more, sometimes less.

Commissioner Powell asked if there was an update on the additional magistrate for North Mecklenburg. Ms. Tanner said no, but she could look into it. She said they were granted additional magistrate conditions and flexibility regarding how magistrates could be utilized, but how it was being enacted was not known, but she could find out.

Background: Mecklenburg County Air Quality (MCAQ) is requesting approval to apply for up to \$75,000 in Climate Pollution Reduction Grant (CPRG) funds in a sub-grant from the Centralina Regional Council (CRC). This CPRG funding will reimburse the County for costs associated with providing technical support and subject matter expertise to CRC as part of developing a regional climate plan.

The CPRG program, a product of the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, is focused on generating greenhouse gas (GHG) pollution reductions. The CPRG is being implemented in two grant phases: planning grants and implementation grants. CRC is the lead organization for the Charlotte-Concord-Gastonia NC/SC Metropolitan Statistical Area planning grant. CRC will award a subgrant to MCAQ for the purposes of providing technical oversight and subject matter expertise on three deliverables: a Priority Climate Action Plan due March 2024; a Comprehensive Climate Action Plan due Summer 2025; and a Status Report, due at the close of the 4-year grant period.

23-0593 FY2024 NCDOT RURAL OPERATING ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (ROAP) GRANT APPLICATION

Approve the Certified Statement for the FY2024 Rural Operating Assistance Program in Mecklenburg County;

Approve the application for the North Carolina Department of Transportation's Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) Grant for Fiscal Year 2024 in Mecklenburg County Department of Child, Family, & Adult Services;

Amend the 2023-2024 Annual Budget Ordinance to recognize, receive and appropriate \$398,468 from the State to the General Fund (0001) within the Department of Child, Family, & Adult Services.

Background: Mecklenburg County Department of Child, Family, & Adult Services is submitting a Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) grant application. This NCDOT grant provides funding for transportation services to elderly and disabled citizens, Work First clients requiring transitional/employment transportation services, and the general public living outside the urban area boundary not the metropolitan boundary of Mecklenburg County and do not have a human service agency or organization paying for their transportation. The Mecklenburg Transportation System (MTS) of CFAS' Services for Adults Division operates this program. The NC General Assembly reinstated the allocation of ROAP funds statewide in FY24 to assist with community needs and ensuring that resources are met.

The Elderly and Disabled Transportation Assistance Program (EDTAP) Formula allocation is \$361,539 and does not have a county match. The Elderly & Disabled Transportation Assistance Program (EDTAP) provides operating assistance for the public transportation of elderly and disabled citizens.

The Employment Transportation Program (ETP) allocation is \$299.00 and does not have a county match. The Employment Transportation Assistance Program provides operating assistance for the public transportation of person with employment related transportation needs.

The Rural General Program (RGP) allocation is \$36,630 and does not have a county match.

The Rural General Public Program (RGP) operating funds are intended to provide transportation services to individuals who do NOT have a human service agency or organization that will pay for the transportation service and live in the non-urbanized area of the county.

CERTIFIED STATEMENT FY2024 RURAL OPERATING ASSISTANCE PROGRAM County of Mecklenburg

WHEREAS, the state-funded, formula-based Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) administered by the North Carolina Department of Transportation, Integrated Mobility Division provides funding for the operating cost of passenger trips for counties within the state;

WHEREAS, the county uses the most recent transportation plans (i.e., CCP, CTIP, LCP) available and other public involvement strategies to learn about the transportation needs of agencies and individuals in the county before determining the sub-allocation of these ROAP funds;

WHEREAS, the county government or regional public transportation authorities created pursuant to Article 25 or Article 26 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes (upon written agreement with the municipalities or counties served) are the only eligible recipients of Rural Operating Assistance Program funds which are allocated to the counties based on a formula as described in the Program Guidelines included in the ROAP State Management Plan. NCDOT will disburse the ROAP funds only to counties and eligible transportation authorities and not to any sub-recipients selected by the county;

WHEREAS, the county finance officer will be considered the county official accountable for the administration of the Rural Operating Assistance Program in the county, unless otherwise designated by the Board of County Commissioners;

WHEREAS, the passenger trips provided with ROAP funds must be accessible to individuals with disabilities and be provided without discrimination on the basis of national origin, creed, age, race, or gender (FTA C 4702.1B, FTA C 4704.1A, Americans with Disabilities Act 1990); and

WHEREAS, the period of performance for these funds will be July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024 regardless of the date on which ROAP funds are disbursed to the county.

NOW, THEREFORE, by signing below, the duly authorized representatives of the County of Mecklenburg North Carolina certify that the following statements are true and accurate:

- The county employed a documented methodology for sub-allocating ROAP funds that involved the
 participation of eligible agencies and citizens. Outreach efforts to include the participation of the
 elderly and individuals with disabilities, persons with limited English proficiency, minorities and lowincome persons in the county's sub-allocation decision have been documented.
- The county will advise any sub-recipients about the source of the ROAP funds, specific program
 requirements and restrictions, eligible program expenses and reporting requirements. The county will

- The county will provide an accounting of trips and expenditures in monthly reports to NCDOT –
 Integrated Mobility Division or its designee. Back-up documentation is required to support the
 monthly reports, failure to provide documentation will affect future disbursements. The June
 report will be considered the annual report.
- Any interest earned on the ROAP funds will be expended for eligible program uses as specified in the ROAP application. The County will include ROAP funds received and expended in its annual independent audit on the schedule of federal and state financial assistance. Funds passed through to other agencies will be identified as such.

23-0594 DUKE ENDOWMENT SCHOOL-BASED ORAL HEALTH IMPLEMENTATION PLAN GRANT

Affirm submission of a grant application to Duke Endowment for the School-Based Oral Health Initiative up to \$400,000 for a three-year period.

If awarded, recognize, receive, and appropriate the award amount to the General Grants fund (G001) within Public Health.

If awarded, adopt a grant project ordinance for Duke Endowment School-Based Oral Health Initiative Implementation Plan Grant in the General Grant Fund (G001).

Background: This proposed project is to expand School-Based Oral Health Initiatives to provide more comprehensive care to school-aged children across all 178 schools in Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools (CMS), specifically to students within the 54 Title I elementary schools. These comprehensive dental services will be available and more accessible to the 142,536 students in Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools and additional charter school students. With a 24-year history of oral health screenings with Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools students, MCPH knows it is time to expand services and provide more comprehensive care across the County to school-aged children.

Mecklenburg County Health Department's mobile dental clinic will ensure that Mecklenburg County students have access to a broader range of dental services and more in-depth dental education on-site at school following their oral health screenings. This mobile dental clinic van is a sustainable means of reaching school-aged children year-after-year by bringing services to children rather than assuming children will be brought to receive dental services. For over two decades, MCPH has conducted oral health screenings within CMS schools; we are committed to this partnership and know it is time to improve and expand dental outcomes with help from community partner investments like the Duke Endowment and other partners like Delta Dental, who provides dental supplies for all children screened.

This investment will widen the scope of oral health services, reduce oral health disparities, and ensure not only preventative but comprehensive care is offered to more students across Mecklenburg County. The grant period will run from January 2024 to December 2026. The grant application has been submitted; the deadline was September 15, 2023.

23-0548 BUDGET AMENDMENT – DEPARTMENT OF CHILD, FAMILY, AND ADULT SERVICES (REVENUE INCREASE)

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Altman, and unanimously carried, to amend the 2023-2024 Annual Budget Ordinance to recognize, receive and appropriate an increase of \$141,229 in Federal funding from Centralina Council of Governments (CCOG) for the Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) to the General Fund (0001) in the Department of Child, Family, and Adult Services.

Background: Annually, the Department of Child, Family, and Adult Services submits for Board approval the Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) funding plan (also referred to as the County Aging Plan). There was an increase of funding for FY 2024.

The following services are provided with this grant: In-Home Aide Services, Transportation Services, Congregate Meals, Home Delivered Meals, Senior Center Operations, Adult Day Care/Day Health, and Consumer Directed Services.

The additional required match is included in the Department of Child, Family, and Adult Services FY 2024 operating budget. Funding for Mecklenburg County Department of Child, Family, and Adult Services increased by \$141,229.

Background: In November of 2021 the Energy Assistance Provider Portal was established by the NC Department of Health and Human Services. The Energy Assistance Provider Portal will move the payment functionality for the Crisis Intervention Program (CIP), Low Income Energy Assistance Program Mecklenburg County (LIEAP) and Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) from the counties making payments, to the payments being made through an electronic payment by FIS directly to Energy providers checking or savings accounts. The portal became active in October 2022 and nearly all energy providers have enrolled and are being paid directly through the portal.

The 2023-2024 Annual budget will need to be decreased by \$585,373 to true up the funding allocated by the Federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Background: Mecklenburg County Community Support Services will enter into a subcontract for year two (September 30th, 2023 thru September 29th, 2024) with the Center of Health Policies and Inequalities Research at Duke University to provide comprehensive substance use services as a part of a federally funded project. The project, Enhancing Wellness through Affirming Services and Education (EASE), is funded through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and will provide substance abuse treatment services in Charlotte and Durham, North Carolina for individuals with and at high-risk for HIV for a 5-year period lasting through September 29, 2027. The services available in Charlotte to be provided through Community Support Services include individual and group substance use, mental health treatment and care coordination.

A subcontract between Duke University Center for Health Policy and Inequalities Research and Community Support Services would be managed by the Office of Research Support at Duke University. The total subcontract for the 5-year period is \$666,829.00.
