Background: The Planning Board serves as an advisory board to the Board of Commissioners on all matters of planning and zoning.

G.S 160D-307 (b) Appointment. - Membership of joint municipal-county planning agencies or boards of adjustment may be appointed as agreed by counties and cities. The extraterritorial representatives on a city advisory board authorized by this Article shall be appointed by the

board of county commissioners with jurisdiction over the area. The county shall make the appointments within 90 days following the receipt of a request from the city that the appointments be made. Once a city provides proportional representation, no power available to a city under this Chapter is ineffective in its extraterritorial area solely because county appointments have not yet been made. If there is an insufficient number of qualified residents of the extraterritorial area to meet membership requirements, the board of county commissioners may appoint as many other residents of the county as necessary to make up the requisite number. When the extraterritorial area extends into two or more counties, each board of county commissioners concerned shall appoint representatives from its portion of the area, as specified in the ordinance. If a board of county commissioners fails to make these appointments within 90 days after receiving a resolution from the city council requesting that they be made, the city council may make them.

Per Board policy, the Ad-Hoc Interview Committee interviewed four (4) of the five (5) nominees on Tuesday, January 17, 2023. At the conclusion of the interviews, the Ad-Hoc Committee unanimously recommended Peggy Brookhouse and Stacey Brown for the two (2) four-year terms expiring June 30, 2026, and Preethi Srinivasan for the one (1) unexpired term expiring June 30, 2025.

The Ad-Hoc Interview Committee was comprised of the following Commissioners: Laura Meier (Chair), Leigh Altman, Susan Rodriguez-McDowell, and Mark Jerrell.

Commissioner Meier, chair of the Ad-Hoc Interview Committee gave the committee's report and recommendation.

23-8097 BUSINESS INVESTMENT PROGRAM GRANT - ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

Motion was made by Commissioner Jerrell, seconded by Commissioner Meier, and unanimously carried, to open the public hearing to receive comments on a proposed Business Investment Program (BIP) grant to the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Shahid Rana, Economic Development Senior Program Manager, made the presentation.

Background: The Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) is a premier collegiate athletic conference headquartered in Greensboro, NC - since 1953.

The ACC has 15 member institutions from 10 states. Listed in alphabetical order, these 10 states within the ACC's geographical footprint are Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Massachusetts, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, and Virginia.

In Q2 of 2020, the ACC partnered with the Newmark Corporation and began a comprehensive assessment of the organization's structure, operations, staff, and real estate, to determine if its current location and structure will meet future needs.

The ACC and Newmark's compressive interview of over 100 stakeholders determined that the key factors in the future of the ACC will include: Brand Identity, Workforce Recruitment and Retention, Membership and Constituent Accessibility, Workplace, Community Support and Financial Impact.

The ACC BIP Grant was reviewed and voted with majority consent for a Notice of Intent to Approve by the BOCC in Closed Session on May 18, 2022.

The City of Charlotte has voted their approval of a 3-year, 90% grant at their Public Hearing Open Session on November 28, 2022.

Atlantic Coast Conference proposed project meets all the following grant guidelines for a threeyear 50% Business Investment Grant, specifically:

- A taxable investment of \$4,900,000.

- Creation of 50 new jobs with an average wage of \$95,000 (paying 100%+ of the MSA Average wage) by the end of the three-year grant term.

The general terms and condition of this grant include:

- A 3-year, 50% BIP grant in the not-to-exceed amount of \$40,282

- A portion of the grant must be repaid if the company moves this investment from Charlotte within 3 years of the end of the grant term.

- Actual grant payments are based on the value of the investment as appraised by the Mecklenburg County Tax Office.

- All property taxes due from the company must be paid before a grant payment is made.

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MECKLENBURG COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS RESOLUTION APPROVING BUSINESS INVESTMENT PROGRAM GRANT FOR THE ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, Atlantic Coast Conference is seeking to relocate their operations in Mecklenburg County; and

WHEREAS, the organization evaluated sites in Greensboro, NC, Orlando, FL, New York, NY, and Washington D.C.

WHEREAS, this project as described by the organization was determined to meet all of the criteria for a Business Investment Program grant from the County of Mecklenburg, the Board of Commissioners voted its intent to provide a Business Investment Program grant to the company during a closed session meeting on May 18, 2022, and as authorized by the Board, the County communicated this information to the company; and

WHEREAS, taking into consideration the Board's stated intent to make an economic development grant, the organization subsequently decided to relocate in Mecklenburg County. The project will include a capital investment of \$4,900,000 and will create 50 new jobs within three years at an average annual salary of approximately \$95,000. The Business Investment Program grant is a 50% grant over 3 years, with a not to exceed amount of \$40,282. The grant will be subject to the County's standard contract provisions, including compliance requirements for the organization related to job creation targets and claw back provisions; and

WHEREAS, Mecklenburg County Board of Commissioners has determined that this grant will provide new employment opportunities, new taxable property and new economic activity within the County, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the Board of County Commissioners does hereby approve the Business Investment Program grant as described above and authorizes the County Manager to execute a contract for the same, with any necessary or helpful nonmaterial changes.

MANAGER'S REPORT

23-0061 TITLE 42 UPDATE

The Board received an update from the Title 42 meeting held on Tuesday, December 20, 2022.

Dena Diorio, County Manager made the following statement:

On Tuesday, December 20th, 2022, Mecklenburg county convened a discussion with nonprofit faith community and government stakeholders in putting the city of charlotte and charlotte Mecklenburg schools to discuss potential impacts due to anticipated changes of federal border policy under title 42. That's a clause of the 1944 public health services law that allows the federal government to prevent the introduction of individuals into the country during certain public health emergencies. During the height of covid-19 pandemic, a federal public health order was issued that authorized the expulsion of millions of migrants, often without a hearing or ability to seek asylum. While the policy was set to end on December 21st of last year, the U.S. Supreme Court issued a temporary hold on its termination in response to an emergency request from over a dozen states. On January 5th, 2023, President Biden announced new enforcement measures to increase security at the border and reduce the number of individuals crossing unlawfully between ports of entry. These measures seek to expand and expedite legal pathways for orderly migration and i can mows new consequences for those who fail to use those legal pathways. The policy specifically extends the Venezuela parole process to nationals of Cuba, Haiti, and Nicaragua by allowing up to 30,000 individuals per month in these countries to enter the united states for a period of two years and receive work authorization. These individuals must have an eligible sponsor and pass vetting and background checks. Nationals from these four countries illegally entering the united states will face a five-year ban on reentry and eligibility for the parole process and be subject to immediate expulsion to Mexico. The administration also announced plans to expand support for receiving communities and nongovernmental organizations. Supreme court is scheduled to begin hearing oral arguments on March 1st. In the meantime, state and local governments are preparing for any potential impact that should occur should title 42 be lifted. Evidence to the dozens of stakeholders that

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attended our December 20th meeting, Mecklenburg county is fortunate to have a strong set of community partners who stand ready to help to serve the migrant populations. The nonprofit and community partners who attended the meeting provide an array of services for migrant communities, such as primary care and behavioral services, housing, education, legal service, workforce development programs and general cases management. Despite the significant work already being done within the county, stakeholders and partners identified several gaps that cannot currently be filled in our community, given limited resource capacity, and staffing levels across organizations. Some of the most critical gaps identified include local shelter capacity, long term housing options, access to medical and legal services, and basic needs like food and clothing. Later in the agenda, deputy county manager Michael Bryant will present the final round of American rescue funding recommendations, which include an allocation to support this effort. We hope that through continued convening of stakeholders, the county and community partners can further develop partnerships and strategies to share information and resources that can help support migrant communities both already there and those that may come to Mecklenburg county. The next title 42 community partner meeting is set to convene on Tuesday, January 24th. I'll continue to keep the board apprised on information and recommendations that may come from these important discussions.

Comments

Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell thanked County Manager Diorio for her presentation. She said it was a window into the preparations that it would take for our community to respond if we had a very large influx of migrants to our community as it would fall on the local government to take care of them.

The Board took a 5-minute recess then meeting was called back to order.

23-0050 AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT UPDATE

The Board received as information an update on the Coronavirus recovery funds received in Mecklenburg County from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The update included the Manager's funding recommendation for Phase 2 ARPA investments.

Background: On May 10, 2021, the US Department of Treasury announced the launch of the Coronavirus State & Local Recovery Funds, established by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, to provide \$350 billion in emergency funding for eligible state, local, territorial governments. Mecklenburg County received a direct allocation in the amount of \$215 million from the U.S.

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Department of Treasury. The funds will cover eligible costs incurred by December 31, 2024. The performance period to complete projects and investments runs until December 31, 2026.

Dena Diorio, County Manager recognized Michael Bryant's team and committees for working on the proposals, and presentations related to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) update.

Michael A. Bryant, Deputy County Manager, gave the presentation.

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Comments

County Manager Diorio said there were some organizations who put in proposals related to substance use. She said those proposals were carved out because the County had Opioid dollars and would look at those organizations for that and would be bringing the funding plan to the Board at the retreat.

Commissioner Leake thanked County Manager Diorio for all her hard work.

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to approve investments recommended by the Manager, and authorize the County Manager to negotiate the contracts with the identified funding partners.

Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell said she wanted to thank President Biden for the approved ARPA funds. She said the funds would be an investment in people and she was proud that the work could be done to do so. She said she was proud of the Board for directing the funding to grassroots organizations. She said it was a privilege and an honor to vote on such grand amounts of funding.

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Commissioner Meier thanked the staff for working on the proposed distribution of funding. She thanked President Biden for giving funding to the Counties. She said the Counties worked with the people, and therefore they knew where the funds were most needed.

Commissioner Altman said Mr. Bryant's hard work was a labor of love. She said the last four years had been a difficult four years in the political field. She said the funding be approved should be a reminder that there is still good in the world and a lot to be proud of.

Commissioner Griffin said he hoped the funding being approved tonight would start to unlock the doors that had trapped many residents in some neighborhoods due to no fault of their own. He said uplifting the quality of life for residents, would uplift the quality of life for all of us as well.

Commissioner Cotham thanked County Manager Diorio for all her work on approving the funding. She said the funding was creating a future for others to grow and help others going forward.

Commissioner Jerrell said it was a privilege to witness times when he noted that the decisions being made would alter and change the lives of people positively. He recognized the staff that was the boots on the ground and did the work, day in and day out. He said the funding being afforded to grassroots was an intentional effort to have them be heard, seen, helped, and assisted. He thanked his colleagues for the vision for the community and the love they showed for the community. He thanked County Manager Diorio for the vision and for steering the Board in the right direction.

Vice Chair Powell said the meeting tonight was one of her favorite all-time meetings. She said it was beautiful to see all the dialogue that was happening during the recess that was done earlier between the community partners and the Board. She said every single Commissioner and staff had a love for the work they did and towards their community.

23-0065 UNCERTAIN BOUNDARY LINE

The Board received information on uncertain boundary lines between Mecklenburg and Union Counties.

Background: The Assessor's Office recently learned that based upon the location of historical monuments there appears to be some uncertainty of segments of the boundary line between Mecklenburg County and Union County, North Carolina. The Assessor's Office has determined that a portion of the uncertain boundary is in the Shannamara subdivision, which was developed in 2001 and 2002 and straddles the boundary line between Mecklenburg and Union Counties.

Under N.C. General Statute § 153A-18(a), if two or more counties are uncertain of the exact location of the boundary between them, then upon request, the N.C. Geodetic Survey will, on a

cooperative basis, assist the counties in defining the location of the uncertain or disputed boundary. The statutory process involves a written request from each county government to the North Carolina. Geodetic Survey to establish the boundary. It is anticipated that the process will take several months to complete if the Boards of the two counties decide to use this option.

North Carolina Geodetic Survey has provided a preliminary plat as to where the boundary might be located, however, the assessor's office is working on estimating the number of parcels that will be affected by this change in the boundary line. Prior to the recording of the boundary line determined by NC Geodetic Survey, there are several factors to be considered, such as public-

school assignments, voting, emergency services, property tax valuation, deed filings, etc., and similar factors. The CMS and Union County public schools will need to be included in the process as well The Directors of the Board of Elections for both Mecklenburg and Union Counties are in communication to determine if there are any voter record issues that might need to be resolved.

Kenneth Joyner, County Assessor, made the presentation.

Comments

Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell asked if the boundary line issue not being corrected had been going on for the past 20 years. *Mr. Joyner said it was longer than that. He said it was brought up 20 years ago to correct the line. He said they were told by NC Geodetic Service that they did not have any record as to what stopped the process of correcting the boundary line. He said back in 2001 there was no second option where it automatically became the County line. He said there was just the one option where the counties agreed on it.*

Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell said she was shocked that the boundary line issue had gone on for so long. She said thousands of dollars could have been lost. She said the issue only affected District 6 because that was the only district that Union County bordered. *Mr. Joyner said preliminary information showed that over 1,000 acres were included in the dispute, but they would only lose a few acres. He said the valuation would increase slightly, but it was not a significant amount.*

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Commissioner Leake asked what Mecklenburg County would gain by moving forward with the boundary line process. *Mr. Joyner said the presentation being done was just for information only, nothing else was being requested of the Board at the moment.*

Commissioner Leake said at a later time she would like to see information in writing as to what would the next steps be, and what the County would gain as a benefit from those actions.

Commissioner Cotham asked was the boundary line issue only affecting the neighborhood off Idlewild Road. *Mr. Joyner said it was not just that area, but that a large part of the disputed line was in that area. He said he would provide some definitive information as to where the specific affected areas by the boundary line started and ended.*

Commissioner Cotham asked if other borderline areas might have the same issue. *Mr. Joyner* said other areas had been done previously, and as far as he knew Union County was the only one that had an issue remaining.

Commissioner Altman asked if the County was bound to adhere to whatever boundary line had been over the history of the state. *Mr. Joyner said if both counties requested the state to be involved, then they would be bound by the information. He said if both counties were not to send in a Resolution or request to the state, then there would be no issue with Mecklenburg County continuing with the County boundary as it was, and Union County with theirs as it was as well.*

County Attorney Wade said that was correct, it would continue what the boundaries lines had been for the last 20 years. He said if there was a request to the state for both counties to draw the boundary lines then a Resolution had to be adopted, if the counties did not then it would automatically become the boundary line after one year. He said as Union took no action, this Board could take no action as well.

Commissioner Altman asked if someone bought a home in the boundary line being discussed were they given the wrong information by the GIS department. *Mr. Joyner said he was not aware of anyone giving out wrong information. Attorney Wade said as homes were built and sold the title should have show what county they were in.*

Commissioner Griffin said there should be further discussion as to what a Resolution may entail for the County at a later time.

Commissioner Cotham mentioned particular zip codes in Matthews that should be included in the search when researching the specific locations of the property lines.

Vice Chair Powell asked County Manager Diorio and County Attorney Wade what their recommendation was on the boundary lines issue being discussed. *County Attorney Wade said he recommended having a discussion with Union County and coming up with a solution. He said the current boundary lines had been out there for the past 20 years and the ramifications of changes needed to be considered.*

County Manager Diorio said more research and conversations needed to be had between the Counties. She said she wanted the Board to be aware that there were no solid recommendations or information to be given out currently. She said a map of the impacted area could be provided.

Commissioner Cotham said she hoped the state would be involved in coming up with a decision as to the boundary lines. She said if a future Board or Union County later decided to make changes, the State could get a more secure agreement. *County Manager Diorio said they would check into it and see what needed to be done.*

Authorize the County Manager to negotiate fees and execute professional services contracts with selected engineering firms for Storm Water Capital Improvement Projects identified in Fiscal Years 2023 through 2025.

Background: Multiple engineering firms have been selected to perform professional services for Storm Water Capital Improvement Projects to be identified in fiscal years FY23 through FY25. These contracts are necessary for stream restoration projects that will achieve water quality improvement goals identified in the Environmental Leadership Action Plan.

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to amend the FY 2022-2023 Budget Ordinance to recognize, receive and appropriate an increase of state revenue of \$70,700 for the Office of Policy and Prevention program in the General Fund (0001); amend the FY 2022-2023 Budget Ordinance to recognize, receive and appropriate an increase of federal revenue of \$26,492 for the ETE Implementation program in the General Fund (0001); amend the FY 2022-2023 Budget Ordinance to recognize, receive and appropriate an increase of federal revenue of \$8,592 for the Women's Health program in the General Fund (0001); and amend the FY 2022-2023 Budget Ordinance to recognize, receive and appropriate a decrease of federal revenue of \$727 for the TB Control program in the General Fund (0001)

Background: The North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) Division of Public Health notified the Health Department of an increase in funding to 1) document tobacco industry activity in the Tobacco Prevention and Control Region 4, and 2) to educate communities about deceptive and targeted marketing tactics utilized by the tobacco industry. Region 4

includes Mecklenburg, Union, Stanly, Cabarrus, Rowan, Gaston, Cleveland, Lincoln, Catawba, Alexander, and Iredell counties. The Health Department will use this funding to conduct an

environmental scan of the tobacco retail environment in Mecklenburg County and in two other Region 4 rural communities, as well as to develop communication materials to support community mobilization efforts. These mobilization efforts will focus on preventing youth tobacco use and addressing health disparities related to tobacco use.

The North Carolina Division of Public Health (DPH) notified the Health Department of an increase in funding to increase by 100 the number of uninsured and underinsured individual at high risk of HIV that will be provided with PrEP-related services.

The North Carolina Division of Public Health (DPH) notified the Health Department of an increase in funding for Title X for the purchase of family planning methods to provide to clients seeking family planning services.

The North Carolina Division of Public Health (DPH) notified the Health Department of a decrease in funding to help offset the North Carolina mandated legislative salary increase for 2023. For this reason, minimal reduction is being made at the local health department level.

22-8095 ABANDON A PORTION OF THE RIGHT-OF-WAY CATAWBA AVENUE

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to adopt a Resolution requesting the Board of Transportation to abandon a portion of the right-of-way and maintenance for Catawba Avenue.

Background: A property owner has petitioned the Board of County Commissioners to request the North Carolina Board of Transportation abandon a portion of the right-of-way and maintenance of Catawba Avenue (0.55 acres) to construct street improvements as part of the Hoke Master Plan approved by the Town of Davidson. The Town will accept maintenance of the right-of-way when abandoned by the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT). This portion of Catawba Avenue is located in the northeast portion of the County and connects to Potts Street adjacent to the corporate limits of the Town of Davidson. Attached is a vicinity map showing the location. This portion of Catawba Avenue is currently located in the incorporated area of the Town of Davidson but was formerly located in the unincorporated area of Mecklenburg County and maintained by the NCDOT. The property owner petitioned the Town of Davidson Board of Commissioners seeking annexation by the Town pursuant to General Statute 160A-31 and the Town issued an order extending the Town limits to include this portion of Catawba Avenue on November 15, 2022. Attached is a copy of the Town of Davidson annexation order.

The provisions of General Statute section 136-63 allow a property owner to petition the Board of County Commissioners to request the Board of Transportation to abandon any road in the

secondary system when the best interest of the people of the county will be served by the abandonment. General Statute section 160A-31 allows a property owner to petition a town for extension of the corporate limits of the town to include the property. The property owner adjacent to this portion of Catawba Avenue petitioned the Town of Davidson and the Town agreed to extend the corporate limits to include the property. When the property owner requested the annexation, the owner requested that the Board of County Commissioners petition the Board of Transportation to abandon the right-of-way. Based upon the annexation by the Town of Davidson, it is in the best interest of the people of Mecklenburg County for the Board of Transportation to abandon the right-of-way and maintenance of this portion of Catawba Avenue.

22-8096 EASEMENT DONATIONS - SUGAR CREEK GREENWAY

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to accept donation of Permanent Greenway and Temporary Construction Easement on portions of Tax Parcels 143-272-11 (+/- 0.52 ac), 143-274-84 (+/- 0.51 ac), and 143-276-60 (+/- 0.04 ac), for Sugar Creek Greenway from P&L Coliseum, L.P. and P&L Coliseum Residential Developer, LLC.

Background: The subject property owners, P&L Coliseum, L.P. and P&L Coliseum Residential Developer, LLC have agreed to donate greenway easements on Tax Parcels 143-272-11, 143-274-84, and 143-276-60 in the City of Charlotte along Sugar Creek.

The donated easements provide real estate needed to construct potential access trail connections from the City Park subdivision to the future Sugar Creek Greenway trail to be located on adjacent County-owned property (tax parcel 143-272-07).

The donation is consistent with Park and Recreation's Greenway Master Plan that calls for the addition of greenway and open space within the County.

22-8098 BONDING REQUIREMENTS FOR FINANCE OFFICER

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to approve increase required performance bond for County Finance Officer to \$1,000,000, effective January 1, 2023.

Background: Since 2005, the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act (LGBFCA) has required finance officers of units of local government and public authorities in North Carolina to provide to their respective entities a faithful performance bond with sufficient sureties in an amount not less than fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars. Recently, the General Assembly enactment Section 9.(a) of S.L. 2022-53, that the minimum coverage will increase as of January 1, 2023. For units of local government and public authorities with "annually budgeted funds" in excess of \$500,000, the minimum amount increased from \$50,000 or an amount equal to 10 percent of the unit or an authority's annually budgeted funds, up to a cap of \$1,000,000. Based upon the County's budgeted funds and In accordance with this change, the bonded amount for David Boyd (Chief Financial Officer) will need to increase to \$1,000,000 effective January 1, 2023.

23-0010 FY2020 FTA 5307 URBAN TRANSPORTATION GRANT PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE EXTENSION

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to amend the 2022-2023 Annual Budget Ordinance to recognize, receive and appropriate an increase up to \$266,345 from the Federal Transportation Administration to the

General Fund (0001) within the Department of Social Services.

Background: Mecklenburg County Department of Social Services received an FY 2020 5307 Urban Transportation Grant and delays at North Carolina Department of Transportation led to the funds not being awarded until after the end of fiscal year 2020. As a result, Mecklenburg Transportation System was not able to use the vehicle replacement portion of the award to buy replacement vehicles. The period of performance end date has been extended from June 20, 2020, to June 30, 2024, making these funds available to use for the purchase of vehicle replacements. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5307 Urbanized Area Formula Program provides funds for

public transit in urbanized areas. The 5307 allocation of \$266,345.00 requires a 20% county match which is already included in the FY2022-2023 annual budget.

23-0027 CAPITAL RESERVE REQUEST FOR MECKLENBURG COUNTY SPORTSPLEX SYNTHETIC TURF FIELDS

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to appropriate \$150,000 in available funds from the Synthetic Turf Capital Reserve Fund (9002) for maintenance infill replenishment on (4) synthetic turf fields and general repair of (2) additional synthetic turf fields at Mecklenburg County Sportsplex.

Background: Capital Reserve accounts were established to provide funding to maintain synthetic turf fields. Mecklenburg County Sportsplex has 4 synthetic turf fields that have reached low levels of natural infill that has created a potential concern for player safety. The selected infill material for replenishment will be all-natural brock-fill that has a 10-year warranty on natural breakdown. General repair is needed on two additional fields at Mecklenburg County Sportsplex to repair the stone base. These are maintenance projects in the overall preventive maintenance plan for all-natural infill surfacing synthetic fields.

23-0046 GRANT APPLICATION - OVW JUSTICE FOR FAMILIES 2023

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to approve submission of renewal grant application to the U.S. Department of Justice.

Office on Violence Against Women for the Justice for Families Program for up to \$600,000 over three years to support operations of the Supervised Visitation Safe Exchange Center; and if awarded, adopt a grant project ordinance for the grant Justice for Families Program in the General Grant Fund (G001); and if awarded, recognize, receive, and appropriate funds to the General Grants Funds (G001) within Community Support Services department for the grant period.

Background: The Supervised Visitation and Safe Exchange Center, which opened in November 2014, provides a secure environment for custody exchange or supervised visits between children and their parents who are impacted by intimate partner domestic violence. The Center, which was created via a partnership between Mecklenburg County, the 26th Judicial District, and Safe

Alliance increases safety for adult and child victims of intimate partner domestic violence while decreasing opportunities for further abuse. This grant will fund a court liaison position that facilitates efficient court referrals for supervised visitation and safe exchange services.

GRANT PROJECT ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, Mecklenburg County is applying and/or has been awarded a grant from the Office on Violence Against Women in the United States Department of Justice. The grant has been made available to

Mecklenburg County under the Grants to Support Families in the Justice System Program (referred to as the Justice for Families Program) up to the amount of \$600,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the grant funds must be used for improving the capacity of courts and communities to respond to families affected by domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking, or in cases involving allegations of child sexual abuse; and

WHEREAS, the Mecklenburg County Board of County Commissioners deems this activity to be a worthy and desirable undertaking;

NOW, THEREFORE, PURSUANT TO N.C.G.S. 159-13.2, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MECKLENBURG COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS that:

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to approve the creation of 5 full-time, grant-funded, positions aligned with the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration - Resiliency in Communities After Stress and Trauma (ReCast) grant, which will expire when funding is exhausted.

Background: The department received new funding for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for FY23 Resiliency in Communities After Stress and Trauma (ReCast). The goal of the federal program is to promote resilience, trauma-informed approaches, and equity in communities that have recently faced civil unrest, community violence, and/or collective trauma. Grant funds will be used to support strategies in The Way Forward Community Violence Prevention Plan and initiatives to increase the capacity community entities to address trauma.

The 5 positions include 1 full-time Sr. Health Program Manager and 4 full-time Health Program Supervisors (Coordinators).
