CALL TO ORDER

Chair Dunlap called this portion of the meeting to order, which was followed by introductions, invocation by Chair Dunlap and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag; after which, the matters below were addressed.

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Powell, and unanimously carried to authorize the County Manager to negotiate and execute all documents necessary for the acquisitions of tax parcel 059-271-01 (+ / - 8.377 acres) from Robbie Garrett for a purchase price of \$520,000 for Park and Recreation purposes.

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Motion was made by Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell, seconded by Commissioner Powell, and unanimously carried to authorize the County Manager to negotiate and execute all documents necessary for the acquisitions of tax parcel 105-161-23 (+ / - 2.34 acres) from Sheryl Plott and spouse Vicki Plott for a purchase price of \$320,000 for Park and Recreation purposes.

Motion was made by Commissioner Powell, seconded by Commissioner Griffin, and unanimously carried to authorize the County Manager to negotiate and execute all documents necessary for the acquisitions of a portion of tax parcel 015-223-10 (+ / - 3.6 acres) from Sherry Moore-Reed for a purchase price of \$224,600 for Park and Recreation purposes.

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Powell, and unanimously carried to authorize the County Manager to negotiate and execute all documents necessary for the acquisitions of a Permanent Greenway Easement (+ / - .39 acres) and a Temporary Construction Easement .07 acres on a portion of tax parcel 143-133-02 from Duke Energy Carolinas LLC. for a purchase price of \$ 38,225 for construction of a portion of the Sugar Creek Greenway.

Motion was made by Commissioner Rodriguez-McDowell, seconded by Commissioner Leake, and unanimously carried to authorize the County Manager to negotiate and execute all documents necessary for the acquisitions of a Permanent Greenway Easement .3.5 and a Temporary Construction Easement .80 on a portion of tax parcel 143-272-04 and 143-272-09 from Coliseum Inn owner LLC. for a purchase price of \$ 122,750 for construction of a portion of Sugar Creek Greenway.

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Griffin, and unanimously carried to accept the County Statutory right of Refusal for tax parcel 079-017-29 (+ / - 4.18 acres) and authorize the County Manager to negotiate and execute all documents necessary for the acquisition of 1400 N. Graham Street for the purchase price of \$6,500,000.00.

AWARDS/RECOGNITION

23-0695 PROCLAMATION – WORLD AIDS DAY 2023 (CHAIR DUNLAP)

Proclamation was read by Commissioner Griffin.

Background: World AIDS day began in 1988 and is observed each year on December 1. Organizations and individuals across the world bring attention to the HIV epidemic, endeavor to increase HIV awareness and knowledge, speak out against HIV stigma, and call for an increased response to move toward ending the HIV epidemic.

Dr. Bernard Davis, RAO Community Health accepted the proclamation and gave remarks.

Motion was made by Commissioner Griffin, seconded by Commissioner Leake, and unanimously carried to adopt a proclamation declaring December 1, 2023, as World AIDS Day in Mecklenburg County.

23-0705 PROCLAMATION – WORLD PREMATURITY DAY (COMMISSIONER PAT COTHAM)

Co-sponsors of this proclamation were Commissioners Jerrell and Meier.

Background: In North Carolina, March of Dimes has worked extensively to reduce preterm birth by improving access to care through closing health insurance gap for individuals of reproductive age, eliminating maternity care deserts, expanding group prenatal care, increasing awareness of impacts of implicit bias on maternal health care, and raising awareness of the importance of optimal preconception health as a strategy to reduce preterm birth, infant mortality and maternal mortality. The month of November is recognized as Prematurity Awareness Month and November 17 is recognized as World Prematurity Day to raise awareness.

Commissioner Patricia Cotham read the proclamation.

Dr. Catherine Ohmstede, Novant Pediatrician, and Swiyyah Muhammad, a Novant Nurse and Midwife accepted the proclamation and made comments

Background: LUESA Code Enforcement requests a revision to the Mecklenburg County Fee Ordinance for Land Use and Environmental Services to comply with the changes approved in HB 488 on August 16, 2023. The changes, particularly pertaining to increased thresholds for General Contractor Licensure include:

1.Page 1: Revised date when approved by the BOCC.
 2.Page 9: Note d: Moves from \$30,000 to \$40,000
 3.Page 11: 1c: Moves from \$30,000 to \$40,000
 4.Page 14: Under expectations (2) Moves from \$30,000 to \$40,000
 5.Page 23: Sections 45.1 Moves from \$30,000 to \$40,000

Upon adoption of these revisions, the fee Ordinance will be in compliance with the legislative changes of August 16th, 2023.

23-0683 STORM WATER PROGRAM- FY24 HAZARD MITIGATION FLOODPLAIN ACQUISITION

Accept the Offer of Sale of Real Estate from RCD PROPERTIES, LLC, owners of property located at 800 and 816 Prince Street, Charlotte, NC (tax parcel 069-071-02), for \$402,000.00 and authorize the Manager to execute all paperwork necessary to complete the transaction.

Authorize local emergency response agencies to use the structures for training exercises.

Background: Since late 1999, Mecklenburg County has used storm water fee revenue to acquire flood prone property. Buyouts reduce the risk to life and property during floods, while also enhancing the natural and beneficial functions of the floodplain. Mecklenburg County uses the land as open space, to expand greenways, to construct wetlands, etc.

The buyout is voluntarily. The owner has agreed to sell the property which contains seven (7) flood prone houses for \$402,000. This purchase price is based off a current fair market value appraisal that assumes three (3) flood damaged non-habitable structures are demolished. Storm Water Services (STW) plans to fund demolition of all seven (7) structures on the property after closing. We anticipate all four (4) remaining habitable structures will be vacant prior to closing but will work with any remaining tenants as needed.

Mitigating the flood risk on this property has been a high priority for STW for many years because of the high probability of flooding and the damage to 7 individual homes/families located on the parcel. Additionally, this acquisition supports an on-going stream restoration project and future open space initiatives.

This action is consistent with goals in the Environmental Leadership Action Plan which supports the Environmental Leadership Policy adopted by the Board of County Commissioners (BOCC). These acquisitions are part of Storm Water's 15-year CIP risk reduction goals and consistent with recommendations in the Flood Risk Assessment and Risk Reduction Plan, adopted by the BOCC on May 1, 2012.

STW staff allows training opportunities for local police and fire personnel prior to demolition of flood prone buildings. In addition, STW staff has established a process with Habitat for Humanity of Charlotte to maximize the responsible reuse of materials prior to structure demolition while protecting the health of the community.

23-0617 CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT – WALKER BRANCH HOOVER CREEK GREENWAY AND AMEND CAPITAL PROJECT ORDINANCE

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Griffin, and unanimously carried, to award a construction contract to JD Goodrum in the amount of \$6,119,131.39 and amend FY2020 Authorization Park and Recreation Capital Ordinance.

Background: Mecklenburg County Asset & Facility Management and Park & Recreation have been involved in the design of a project which will add +/- 1.74 miles of new greenway trail to the County's greenway acceleration initiative. The project includes new greenway trail (asphalt and concrete), drainage structures, stream mitigation, boardwalk, street crossings, renovation of an existing bridge, prefabricated pedestrian bridge, low water crossings, concrete swale bridges and a signalized pedestrian cross-walk. The anticipated construction period will be approximately 18 months.

This action will also amend the FY2020 Park and Recreation Capital Ordinance to allow unused funding from several Park and Recreation projects to be utilized to fund an increase in costs for

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Walker Branch Hoover Creek Greenway, Torrence Trib 2 Greenway, and Naomi Drenan Recreation Center.

MECKLENBURG COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA FY 2020 AUTHORIZATION PARK AND RECREATION CAPITAL PROJECT ORDINANCE

23-0644 NAMING OF COUNTY FACILITY

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to receive an application to name the TownePlace Suites property, located at 7805 Forest Point Blvd, "Forest Point Place" and to schedule a public hearing on December 5, 2023 at 6:30p.m. to receive public comments on the proposed naming of TownePlace Suites property "Forest Point Place."

Background: In December 2022 the County purchased the TownePlace Suites hotel property at 7805 Forest Point Blvd. for conversion to housing for older adults experiencing homelessness and for supportive housing. An application has been submitted to name the TownePlace Suites property, "Forest Point Place." Pursuant to the County's facility naming policy, the Board will need to set a public hearing to receive public comments before approving the request.

23-0658 LEASE AGREEMENT – DISCOVERY PLACE, INC.

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to authorize the County Manager to negotiate and execute a lease between the County and Discovery Place, Inc. for the lease of the new Discovery Place Nature museum that will be located on a portion of Tax Parcel 151-041-01 at Freedom Park.

Background: On April 16, 2019 the Board authorized the County Manager to negotiate and execute a Development Agreement between the County and Discovery Place, Inc. ("DPI"). As part of the FY 2019-2023 Capital Improvement Plan the County allocated \$16,000,000 for a joint development with DPI for replacement of the existing nature museum. The facility is currently located at 1658 Sterling Road on the Freedom Park site, and the new building will be at this same location. The existing building has outlived its useful life and needs replacing to modernize the facility. The total design & construction cost is estimated at \$40+ Million with the County contributing \$16,000,000 and DPI responsible for providing the balance of the funds. The Development Agreement describes general requirements for DPI to secure funding for their portion of the project and provide documentation of such funding commitments to the County. Once the new building is constructed, DPI will lease it from the County.

The next step is for the County to enter a construction contract with Rodgers Builders, the Construction Manager at Risk selected for the project. Before entering the contract, the County needs documentation of DPI's funding sources for construction. DPI's bank providing the construction loan requires DPI to demonstrate the County has authorized the negotiation and

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execution of a lease of the future facility before the loan documentation will be provided. If approved by the board, the County Manager will negotiate and execute a lease consistent with the following major business terms:

Premises: Approximate 13-acre site with surface parking and outdoor exhibits and an approximate 26,000 SF New Building

Rent: One Dollar (\$1.00) per year Initial term: Thirty-five (35) years

Renewals: Following the 35-year initial period, the lease will automatically renew for three (3) consecutive five (5) year periods, unless terminated by either County or DPI.

Operations/Maintenance: DPI will be responsible for day-to-day operations of the nature museum, including interior janitorial services and maintenance of all interior and exterior exhibits. County is responsible for repair, replacement, and maintenance of building systems, including structural, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, life safety systems, and exterior of the building and site.

Utilities: DPI to pay for water, sewer, gas, electric, cable services and data connectivity for their network. County to pay for data connectivity for its network.

23-0675 RESOLUTION CERTIFYING NOVEMBER 7, 2023, BOND REFERENDUM RESULTS

Motion was made by Commissioner Leake, seconded by Commissioner Jerrell, and unanimously carried, to adopt a resolution certifying the results of the Special Election held November 7, 2023, regarding the \$2,500,000,000 School Bond Referendum and to direct the Clerk to the Board to publish the Statement of Result of Special Election held November 7, 2023.

Background: This action is necessary to comply with statutory requirements to authenticate the bond referendum. This is the final action required by the board relative to the referendum.

RESOLUTION CERTIFYING AND DECLARING THE RESULTS OF THE SPECIAL BOND REFERENDUM ON THE BOND ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS, HELD FOR THE COUNTY OF MECKLENBURG, NORTH CAROLINA ON NOVEMBER 7, 2023

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County of Mecklenburg, North Carolina has considered the Certificate of Canvass of the Mecklenburg County Board of Elections canvassing the referendum held for the County of Mecklenburg, North Carolina on November 7, 2023 and certifying the result thereof to the Board of Commissioners and has canvassed the result of said Referendum.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF MECKLENBURG, NORTH CAROLINA that it be and hereby is certified and declared that the number of voters registered and qualified to vote at said Referendum was [776,318].

BE IT <u>FURTHER RESOLVED</u>, that it be and hereby is certified and declared that the total number of voters who voted "Yes" in answer to the question

"SHALL the order authorizing \$2,500,000,000 of bonds plus interest to provide funds to pay the costs of constructing, improving, and renovating school facilities, specifically including, among other things, the construction and renovation of classroom facilities, the construction and equipping of athletic facilities, the acquisition and installation of furnishings and equipment, the acquisition of land, rights-of-way and easements in land required therefor, and related public infrastructure development and providing that additional taxes may be levied in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds be approved?";

Background: The mission of Community Support Services Intervention and Prevention Services Division is to connect the dots among multiple forms of violence to promote a healthier, safer and more equitable community through intervention, primary and secondary prevention. Funding from the Project Safe Neighborhoods initiative for the Western District of North Carolina will be used by the department to work with community stakeholders to address violent crime. Mecklenburg County is requesting up to \$50,000 in grant funding to implement: Count the Kicks Stillbirth Prevention Program. The grant period is from December 15, 2023 - June 30th, 2024.

The purpose is to implement this evidence-based stillbirth prevention program that teaches expectant parents the method of and importance of monitoring their baby's movements daily during the third trimester of pregnancy. The goals of this program are to lower the stillbirth rate, improve outcomes for moms, and safe health births. Count the Kicks helps expectant parents get to know their baby's normal movement patterns and empowers them to contact their healthcare provider right away if there is change in what's normal for their baby.

Mecklenburg County Health Department does not currently have a stillbirth prevention program in place, and the need for this in our community is strong. With Count the Kicks, county residents will benefit from proven, evidence-based pregnancy education.

The application deadline is November 15, 2023.
