Recap – BOCC Endorsed Funding Plan

Mecklenburg County received \$39.2M in Coronavirus Relief Funds



- \$24M for cost incurred to-date & projected through 12/30/2020
- \$15.2M remaining for investments in broad categories
- Board supported the recommended spend plan:
 - \$8.1M = Immediate Investments
 - \$7.1M = Planned Investments
- Gives consideration to the towns & unincorporated areas

Community Response

Assistance for individuals, families, and seniors impacted by COVID 19 (i.e., rental & mortgage assistance, food & utilities assistance, workforce development)

Continuity of Operations


Investments required to return the organization to full operations (i.e., PPE, facility modifications, technology)

Economic Development

Financial support to assists businesses with recovering from COVID 19

Emergency Response

Investments to offset expenses incurred in response to COVID 19 (i.e., salaries, communications)



\$300,000 for Senior Nutrition

Food Security

\$1M for Food Security



Provider	Amount	Description
Loaves & Fishes	\$500,000	Purchase 1.2 million additional pounds of food to serve an additional 50,000 households
Second Harvest Food Bank	500,000	Purchase equipment, such as refrigerated trucks and staffing to serve an additional 140,000 households

General Assistance

\$1.5M for General Assistance

Provider	Amount	Description
CMHP*	\$1,000,000	Expand the rental assistance program to serve 1,000 additional households that reside outside of the City of Charlotte limits
Social Serve	500,000	Provide rental assistance, hotel stay extensions, utility payments & staffing to support an additional 535 households

Personal Protection Equipment

\$1M for Personal Protection Equipment

- I.6 million masks received to-date
- o Efforts underway to distribute I million masks community wide
- o \$1 million in coronavirus funds remain available for PPE investments
