




What is the CHA?








% of Adults (18+) without a Primary Care Provider



Rate of Youth ED Visits Due to Suicide Attempts per 100,000 Population



Rate of ED Visits Due to Depression per 100,000 Population



Mental Health ED Visits














2022 Births and Birth Outcomes






% of 18+ Adults who are Current Smokers


% of Adults (18+) with no physical activity within past 30 days




Homicide Rate per 100,000 Population
